Child sex offences recorded by police

The NSPCC has released figures which show that the number of child sex offences recorded by police forces in the UK rose to 55,507 in the last year, an increase of almost a fifth from the previous year. A Freedom of Information request revealed that 3,565 crimes were against children aged 10 and under; and 2,799 crimes were against children not yet attending primary school.

To address the increasing number of recorded child sex offences the NSPCC is calling for: specialist training for police investigating online child abuse; investment in early intervention services to help children recover; effective rehabilitation for child sex offenders to prevent them from hurting more children.

Social care innovations in Hampshire and the Isle of Wight

The Department for Education (DfE) has published an evaluation of a range of measures supporting early intervention, looked-after children and child protection in settings across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight. Findings include: skilled administrators have enabled a decrease in social worker time spent on administrative tasks (from 36% to 14%) and an increase in the time they are spending with families (from 34% to 58%); the family intervention team pilot saw family engagement rise from pre-pilot levels of 29% to approximately 70% in Hampshire and 87% in the Isle of Wight.

New offence of sexual communication with a child

The Justice Secretary Elizabeth Truss, has announced that a new offence of sexual communication with a child will come into effect on 3 April 2017. The offence will cover both online and offline communication, including through social media, e-mail, and letters, with adult groomers facing up to two years in prison and being automatically placed on the sex offenders register.

Interviewing men who pose a sexual risk

The NSPCC's Impact and evidence series features a blog by Emma Belton Associate Head of Evaluation at the NSPCC offering advice about interviewing men who pose a sexual risk to children. Tips include: reading up on and speaking to colleagues who have carried out similar interviews; finding out about the interviewees previous contact with the service; being clear about what the interview will cover, sticking to the focus of the interview and not hesitating to stop the interview if necessary; having a clear process for reporting any concerns; debriefing as soon as possible after the interview.

Childhood adversity and risk of suicidal behaviour

Samaritans has published a report looking at socioeconomic disadvantage and suicidal behaviour. Findings from the UK-wide research shows that: experiences of childhood adversity increase the risk of suicidal behaviour, especially among those who are socioeconomically disadvantaged; and unemployment is more likely among those who have adverse childhood experiences, particularly men who have experienced childhood sexual abuse.

Rethinking 'did not attend'

Nottingham City Safeguarding Children Board has produced a short video animation to encourage practitioners to identify children as 'Was Not Brought' as opposed to 'Did Not Attend' (DNA) when referring to them not being presented at medical appointments. The NSPCC thematic briefing on learning from case reviews for the health sector finds that the DNA category does not recognise the real issue which is children not being taken to appointments, a potential indicator of neglect.
